
Net Zero Homes Nearing Completion

Our new net zero homes represent the Store. next step toward this goal.

Three units of small scale housing are being built on one various sizes to accomsingle-family home lot, located at 1021 8th St. NW. Net zero means there will be as much energy produced on site as is consumed each year. The homes are all electric and super efficient, with solar panels, thick and well-insulated sq ft. They embrace a walls, air source heat pumps and EV chargers, and they are built in a healthy, sustainable way.

Frank connected with Matthew 25 after retiring at a fairly young age. He was searching for purpose and meaning in his life after a fulfilling career. Now that work wasn't his routine, what would feed his soul, connect him

with others and make the world a better place? Eventually, he found his way to the tool library. There, he helps homeowners move forward with challenging projects, works with a team of other caring people and puts his faith in action.

Jasmine (name changed) is a single mom who works hard to make ends meet around the home. She wanted a place

where she could give back to others and develop her cooking skills. She volunteers as a cook at the cafe and always brings a big smile and abundant joy to everything she does.

Cedar River Academy students work with Kendal, Matthew 25's Education Leader, to grow food in their school garden. When harvest time comes, they pack up some of what they've grown to take home. Other times, they bring lettuce and a variety of fresh produce to Groundswell Cafe or the Corner Store to help feed those who are hungry. They seem to walk with an extra spring in their step how the big challenges the planet and a few inches taller as they proudly share their bounty.

At the core of Matthew 25's work is engaging a diversity of people in the pay-it-forward lifestyle. In a casual tour of Matthew 25, you can see pay-it-forward results everywhere. At the Cafe, one of our frequent visitors and supporters decides to drop \$300 in the pay-itforward fund to make up for the shortfall in contributions this week. He is helped by one of our volunteers working the cash register. Sitting at the table in the Cafe is a group of four, including two who recently paid for a new walk-in cooler.

We are saddened to share that Philip Hamilton, our beloved recent Groundswell Director, died unexpectedly at the young age of 37. Philip came to Matthew 25 as our Volunteer Coordinator following the derecho in 2020. He would later transition into the role of Groundswell Director, putting to use his years of culinary training and experience in



highly-rated restaurants in New Orleans and elsewhere. In Groundswell, Philip found a way to put his deep yearnings for food justice, equity and authentic friendships to work.

To honor his memory, Philip's family and Matthew 25 created the Philip Hamilton Pay-It-Forward Endowed Fund to permanently support the pay-it-forward program at Groundswell Cafe. Chickens on the Urban Farm


This spring we began an exciting new project at the Urban Farm. Thanks to grant funding from Theisen's and Farm Credit Services, and the skills of our Neighborhood Building department, we were able to build a coop

and welcome six new chickens to the farm. If you have ever had the joy of raising chickens you know how fun they are to watch, and nothing beats fresh eggs, but we have a few other plans for our new friends. We are going to put them to work.



In April, we lovingly chose six chicks from Theisen's of three different varieties to join our squad. Once they had grown enough we moved them out to the coop. It was obvious that they were going to be the highlight for a lot of the local students who visit the Urban farm throughout the year. This was particularly true for our elementary school visitors, and summer food camp participants.

Part of the Cultivate Hope education program is to connect students to the food they eat. We encourage them to explore the food they can grow themselves,



This August, the chickens began laying eggs, and we are excited to host



the students from Cedar River Academy in October for their annual fall field trip. We know the students will be excited to see how much the chickens have grown.

The farm itself has also benefited, as chickens are compost accelerators. When allowed to forage in beds after harvest, they turn and aerate the soil while searching for scraps and bugs. All while keeping the weeds down and preparing the beds for future plantings. We have begun this process on a small scale and hope to have our coop fully mobile this fall.
